"They put in extraordinary effort, sometimes working up to 30 hours without stopping. We were all across the county in Glenflesk, Halfybunion, Killorglin and Tralec.

"It was one of the busiest times I have ever seen. We answered 11 storms," said Mr Brosnan.

"We gave out the certs of appreciation to say thanks to them for all they did."

Saturday also marked the Kerry Civil Defence awards night and social gathering and awards were also given to volunteers for long-time service. Four volunteers recived certificates for 20 years of service with the voluntary body.

Since the extraordinary storms that battered the county the Kerry Civil Defence have now further upgraded their resources and strategies for dealing with such weather conditions including the addition of snockels to the vehicles and also waterproofing the interior.

Kerry Civil Defence have also begun recruiting for new members this year. Currently there are six centres across Kerry in Kenmarc, Killarney, Tralee, Listowel, Ventry and Cahersiveen and more than 120 volunteers, including some new recruits.
